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Trouble on the Verge

At this time of year the ground is very soft and so traffic damage to our grass verges is made much worse than when the ground is hard as it is in the summer months.

Recently we have seen much more damage caused to our verges by heavy vehicles than is usual at this time of year. It is all too easy to say that this damage is the result of careless and inconsiderate heavy vehicle drivers.

To some extent this undoubtedly is the case but not always – we sometimes contribute to the problem ourselves by trying to squeeze by rather than backing up, or by parking in the road rather than our driveways, or by **not** noting down and reporting to the police the registration number of vehicles we see damaging a grass verge.

Living in a rural community as we do, we must accept that sometimes damage to our grass verges is unavoidable, nevertheless, we must try to act as good neighbours and do our best prevent this sort of damage occurring.

Let's be aware and responsible about the problem.

One of the most important ways is to take an active part in Neighbourhood Watch. This is a co-ordinated scheme providing eyes and ears to help protect your property especially when you are at work or on holiday.

Does Neighbourhood Watch work?

We get lots of calls from N/W co-ordinators and its members. It is true that many turn out to be nothing illegal but all are genuine calls from concerned people.

Once in a while the call turns up trumps like the person who saw a car near a church. The car was not known to him and it was unusual for a car to be parked at this location in the afternoon. Knowing through N/W that churches had been broken into he called the police and gave the car number. The car was subsequently stopped by an officer in Woodbridge where it was found to contain items stolen from the church. A search of the occupant's premises revealed lots of other church-like items including a priceless painting from Rendlesham.

So the answer is YES it does work but it is only as good as its members

Remembrance Sunday

In December's Church News Suzanne Stanford wrote:

"On Remembrance Sunday, a half-muffled quarter of 1260 Stedman Doubles and Grandsire Doubles was rung.

I'm not sure whether anyone other than the ringers actually read this column every month. (It would be interesting to know!) It has occurred to me that the preceding paragraph may be completely unintelligible to non-ringers! So, some brief words of explanation. 'Norwich', 'Stedman', and 'Grandsire' are all names of ringing 'methods', like pieces of music. A 'Minor' method is one rung with six bells changing their position relative to each other, whereas a 'Doubles' method has five bells changing position and the sixth bell staying in the same place at the back, or the end, of each change. 'Half-muffled' is when one side of each clapper has a leather pad fixed to it so when that side of the clapper strikes the bell the sound is muffled, but not on the other side. In this way each complete row of ringing, for example, 123456, sounds alternately loud and soft, which gives the echo effect characteristic of Remembrance Sunday, and funerals. Not as easy to explain as I thought!"



If you were walking out in the Village on Remembrance Sunday morning, you will have heard that half muffled quarter peal. If you were also blessed with a good pair of ears and sense of timing, then you will have noticed how well struck Pettistree bells were on that morning when we all remembered the sacrifices made for us by so many people during the two wars.

Church bells ringing half muffled on Remembrance Sunday is a poignant reminder of our heritage – lest we forget.

Children in Need

On Saturday 14th November Sheila Manning and a number of her colleagues from Suffolk Coastal District Council volunteered to attempt the Army Assault course at Colchester Barracks to raise money for Children In Need. Here is Sheila's account of how she helped Children in Need.

"We were advised to eat a hearty breakfast, pack a hot drink, gloves, belt and a change of clothes. (We were going to get wet and muddy.) On arrival at the course three Army Instructors spent forty minutes explaining the course and showing us the right way to complete each of the sixteen disciplines. Before being let loose on the course we were put through a rigorous warm up session. Then came the hard hats and split into teams. By this time I wondered why I had volunteered, after all this was for 'army training' not for 'office workers'. Too late to back out now, my team were lining up at the start and the stop- watch clicked.

We climbed up isometric steps, we crawled through pipes, we jumped in water, we balanced on six inch planks ten feet high, we swung on ropes and ran across moving obstacles. Then came the fourteen foot high wall, impossible for four females? (We did have a little help from two soldiers.) The last discipline was rope netting, twelve feet high and six feet across AND twelve feet to climb down again before a final sprint back to the beginning.

As we all gathered together after completing the course some of my colleagues were buzzing with excitement, others, myself included, just felt numb. This was certainly a challenge for most of us and we vowed never to do anything like it again!

We did raise £1,500.00 for Children In Need "
