



### PROGRESS REPORT REFURBISHMENT PROJECT

As was mentioned in the last issue of the Pettistree People the Committee have been actively engaged at looking at the state of repair of the village hall. At the last meeting of the committee, in April, it was agreed that the work needing to be carried out consisted of insulating the walls and roofspace, where there is no insulation at present, and take up the old wooden floor and replace it with a new suspended insulated wooden floor.

The costs are still to be finalised; however, as there is sufficient information from existing quotes to let us know what money we are talking about, raising funds has begun. The application for grants is underway and already a very welcome grant of £500 has been received from the Ganzoni Trust and village events as advertised will be looking to add to the 'pot'. An excellent start was made at the recent Fun in the Field Event, we are hopeful of further successes during the year, so please come along to enjoy and support future events.

Due to excellent support in the past we have a healthy start but more funds will be needed for when all the building work is complete, with redecoration and some refurbishment in the kitchen.

We shall keep you informed of progress and better still come to the Annual General Meeting on the 12<sup>th</sup> July 2011 at 7.30pm and join in.



‘A small group of local residents are busy compiling a leaflet of local walks linked with Pettistree heritage sites, buildings and local flora and fauna.

The leaflet will include maps, sketches, photographs and local historical information.

The aim is to make a walk in the countryside around Pettistree more interesting. Walkers and visitors will be able to refer to facts included in the leaflet as they walk and pass places of interest.

The project is funded by the Locality budget granted by the County council.

## Thatched Roofs

On Monday evening May 9<sup>th</sup> our village was invaded by the Woodbridge Fire Brigade with the fire-engine. They were in the village to learn how to strip thatch from a burning roof.

We have in recent years seen an increase in thatched roof fires with devastating results.

It came to my fireman son-in-law Derek's notice that Roger was about to strip all the thatch off a house in Presmere Road He contacted Roger to see if he was able to give some instruction to the fire brigade on how to strip the thatch from a burning roof.

Roger is a Master Thatcher who has lived in the village all his life, and is the third generation Master Thatcher. He was only too happy to assist the fire brigade.

Roger first showed the men from Woodbridge fire brigade how to get the wires next to the reeds off. These are held in place with metal and not hazel pegs as in years gone by. Garden shears can be used to cut these. The straw ridge or top of the roof has to be cut through in sections with a sharp tool to remove it.

The roof is being re-thatched using a fire retardant lining laid under the thatch. This will give the fire brigade an extra 20 minutes before the fire reaches the inside or outside of the house depending on the site of the fire.

## Carpet Bowls

### PETTISTREE CARPET BOWLS CLUB INTER-VILLAGE TRIANGULAR TOURNAMENT

Last winter's tournament began on Thursday 18<sup>th</sup> November at Ufford, where Pettistree were the visitors. The home team started strongly and after four games were ahead 3-1. Try as they may Pettistree could not find the shots needed with the result after eight games a decisive home win 6-1 and one drawn game. Not a good start for the defending champions!

Match two was Dallinghoo v Ufford on Wednesday 15<sup>th</sup> December. The outcome of this contest was a hard fought away victory to Ufford by 4 games to three with one draw. To show how close it was, in game four after 4 of the 5 ends the score was 3-3 and Dallinghoo were holding three shots with only the home skipper to bowl, unfortunately one over-hit wood by the home skipper converted 3 shots up to 1 shot down and Ufford won the game 4-3. This can and does happen to any of us but it illustrates how every bowl can win or lose the game.

Match three was Ufford v Dallinghoo on Thursday 10<sup>th</sup> February. At the halfway point it was all square 2-2 but Ufford made home advantage count after the break 3-1 to give a final score of 5-3 to the home team. Ufford now looked hot favourites to succeed current champions Pettistree in this year's competition.

Match four was Dallinghoo v Pettistree on Wednesday 16<sup>th</sup> February. Both teams were looking for their first victory and Pettistree in particular knew that with both their home matches on the notorious village hall floor to come, a win at Dallinghoo would give them a chance of catching 'in-form' Ufford. The home team had other ideas and played well all evening to record a win 5-2 and one drawn game.

Match five was Pettistree v Dallinghoo on Thursday 10<sup>th</sup> March. Dallinghoo kindly agreed to supply one of their carpets for this contest as it enabled all the players to be constantly involved. I will give the scores game by game so you can check my arithmetic, something I did on the night several times! 5-6; 11-2; 2-9; 1-6; 4-3; 8-1; 1-5; 4-3. I make it 4 games each which gave Pettistree victory 36 shots to 35. Another example of 'every shot counts'!

Match 6 Pettistree v Ufford on Thursday 7<sup>th</sup> April. Could Ufford, the champions elect achieve the Grand Slam by winning all their matches? Three of the visitors play regularly at Pettistree on a Thursday evening and the stage was set. The scores were tight 4-3; 3-2; 4-0; 0-5; 5-3; 2-2; 1-3; 1-3. A victory for Pettistree, four games to three and one draw.

Many congratulations to Ufford, this season's winners, particularly as they have brought to an end a run of six championship victories by Pettistree. Dallinghoo on two occasions were one shot from being runners-up. Final result Ufford 3 wins, Pettistree 2 wins and Dallinghoo 1 win, and a good time was had by all!

## PARISH COUNCIL NEWS

The **Parish Council Election** on 5<sup>th</sup> May went ahead with the minimum of fuss and with no need to vote because the number of candidates matched the number of seats on the Parish Council. Thus the council was declared re-elected by Suffolk Coastal District Council who organise the election. (Parish Councilors names are on P8 of this newsletter.) Seats for Suffolk Coastal District Council were contested on 5<sup>th</sup> May but our two district councilors, Mr Jim Bidwell and Mr Michael Bond were both re-elected. Cllr. Bond is also our county councilor and attends our Parish Council meetings regularly.

May has continued to be a busy time for the Parish Council. At our AGM on 10<sup>th</sup> May I was re-elected Chairman and Maureen Stollery as Vice Chairman. We work well together but will be happy to see others take over our posts in the not too distant future as quite a large time commitment is involved – and lots of e-mails!



The **Annual Parish Meeting** was on 24<sup>th</sup> May to help decide what village activities will be planned and supported. If you were unable to attend please let us know if you have problems or concerns about village life and if you want others to join in with you and stage village events in the coming year, perhaps with some financial help from the Parish Council.

Radio Suffolk and one of the Suffolk Coastal District Councillors have complimented villages on their efforts to tidy up Suffolk in the “Don’t be a Tosser” campaign. We did our bit on Sunday 13<sup>th</sup> March with several

villagers turning up to help. The biggest item cleared was an upright vacuum cleaner retrieved from one of the roadside hedges. One remaining problem is the overgrowth of vegetation at the bus stop opposite the “Three Tuns”. We need someone to give it a regular trim with a strimmer. Please let any councillor know if you could help.



Remarkable weather continues to be one of the main topics of conversation. We have now had several weeks with no appreciable rainfall and the vegetation, especially on our meadows and lawns, is looking very sad. No doubt this will change but will it be in time to save the yield from our gardens and the farmers crops? Bonfires with the risk of sparks and spread will be even more of a concern than usual until the rain returns.

Finally I must give out the good news that the formalities of presenting the Parish Council Accounts have all been completed on time and with no adverse comments. This is all due to the expert help of our Parish Clerk, Clive Mann who gives us invaluable help both between and during our meetings.
